Summary:

 Apr 29th 2020: Fredy Kuenzler mention (on Nanog) that Init7 won a court case against Swisscom on the topic of peering.

Backstory (1)

- Init7 and Swisscom established a zero-settlement peering session in 2011
- This agreement was ended in 2012 with a new proposal of Swisscom that would implies charges if the traffic ratio exceeds 1:2
- In 2013, Init7 filled a request to the ComCom (Federal Communication Commission) to obtain a free peering settlement to Swisscom (opening of the legal part)
- The ComCom granted this for the duration of the procedure

Backstory (2)

- At the time, Swisscom had a agreement with DTAG that states that a percentage of Swisscom's traffic must be sent to DTAG
- Swisscom gets some part of DTAG's transit benefits when DTAG sends traffic to Swisscom
- This could be an incentive for Swisscom to avoid free traffic exchanges (peerings?) as a paying customer would be, in addition of not costing anything, a source of additional benefits.
- This agreement ended in 2016
 (I'll skip most of the specific details, but the legal document is available online.)

Justice Decision

(We are at the highest level of justice in .CH: Federal Administrative Court)

- Swisscom was in a dominant position until their agreement with DTAG ended (2016). This means that the ComCo (Competition Commission) must evalutate what price should be applied for the service for that period.
- For the period after that, (after 2016) the situation must be clarified by the lower instance tribunal.
- The legal cost put upfront by Init7 must be waived and an indemnity will be given by Swisscom.

What now?

TL-DR;

More waiting

Longer version:

- We wait for ComCo's decision related to pricing (up to 2016)
- We wait for the statement of the lower tribunal (post 2016)
- Will this affect the prices Swisscom applies for a paid peering service?
- Will this affect other ISPs, maybe other countries?
- Hopefully more feedback, maybe at next Ripe ? (:wink::wink:)
